Borders MG Northumbria Weekend

5th - 7th June 2015

Staying at the Marshall Meadows Country House Hotel at preferential rates for two nights.

The specially negotiated cost will be £115 per room per night (double or twin room depending on availability) or ££92.50 (single occupancy). This will include a 3 course evening meal, and full breakfast on both nights/days. A 10% deposit will be required to hold your room which is non refundable after 5^{th} May. There is plenty of off-road parking for MGN guests.



Marshall Meadows Hotel

I have mapped out a proposed itinerary however at this stage this is an anticipated outline and could be subject to change before the actual weekend.

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Itinerary

Friday 5th June - make your own way to the venue to arrive at any time after 1:00pm and meet up in the evening for dinner (at a time to be decided).

Saturday 6th June – A circular route of ?? miles (to be decided). The first half of the route will pause for lunch at the riverside restaurant in Abbey St Bathans (not included in price for weekend accommodation).

After lunch a suggested route back to the hotel with several interesting options to suit everyone from the mildly active to the completely bone idle!

You can do one, two or three options or neither, you decide but you will need to schedule your own time.

Option 1 a lovely 3 mile walk from Abbey St Bathans to Edin's Hall Broch and back. A 2nd century iron age round house. Riverside walking, mild climbs and stunning valley views. Then resume the route.

Option 2 a visit to the Jim Clark Room in Duns, containing a display of trophies, photographs and other memorabilia. It provides a full and compelling account of Jim's life in motor racing.

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A newly opened second room, created with the assistance of the Jim Clark Trust, allows visitors to view new images and watch Mark Stewart's biographical film on Jim Clark, "The Quiet Champion". Then resume the route.



Paxton House

Option 3 Paxton House. Not as old as Edin's Hall Broch but a fine example of a Scottish Borders Country Estate. Built between 1758 and 1763 by architect John Adam and his brother James for the young Patrick Home. You can visit the house and grounds or just the 80 acres of woodland and riverside scenery overlooking the majestic River Tweed

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with a large variety of riverside walks, trails and outdoor attractions for visitors to enjoy (entrance to the house and or grounds is not included in the price for the weekend accommodation). Then resume the route.

Option 4 simply take a leisurely drive around the entire route stopping where you want to and make your way back to Marshall Meadows in time to get ready for dinner.

Dinner in the hotel at a time to be decided.

Sunday 7th June – those who wish can make the 32-mile drive across to Thirlstane House for their annual car show. If you want to do this could I would need to know so that I can confirm separately with Tim to meet the registration deadline. If you prefer you can take another suggested route drive from Berwick through Kelso and Kirk Newton back to the A697 and then on to your home.
