February 1989, Chicago Auto Show and Mazda introduced a car to send shivers down MG executives' spines. If only they had been quicker with the F-16!

The Mazda was the Miata, known as the MX-5 over here. It spurred MG Rover on to produce the F and TF (Graham Day is quoted as saying that he could find £40million if a sports car could be built for that, hence the F/TF being built down to a price.)

In September the same year, at the Frankfurt Motor Show, the Landrover Discovery (ex Project Jay) was unveiled to the world. This was a winner and the making of modern Landrover. It is now in its fourth incarnation and speculation is that it will produce a family of cars much as the Range Rover (RR, Sport and Evoque) has done.

The MG number 103 is a 1937 TA owned and driven by Patrick Engleberg from Luxembourg, and his Canadian navigator Christine Borg-Mathiot. They finished 49th and 3rd in class for pre41 cars up to 1400cc. The photo was taken at the start of the timed speed hill climb in the old mine works 5 miles west of Stanhope on the Saturday morning. The hill was tarmac from the start with a small chicane after about 600 yards, and a 5 second stop after 1 mile and then a blast through the trees to the finish in the quarry.

Bellingham Heritage Show

Sunday 13th April and a very bright and sunny start early on, but by 10:00hrs the clouds were rolling in. Even so 12 cars turned up at the start at Denton Burn Library for the run up to the Heritage Classic Car Show, in Bellingham. I used the MG6 as I had 4 passengers and a lot of prizes for Pam's Charity Tombola Stall in the boot. The start list included 4x MGB's, 2x MG TF's. 1 MG Midget, 1x Triumph Stag, 1x Sunbeam Tiger, 1x Morgan +4 and Ken Wood in his Mazda MX5, who was only doing the start and the first few miles as he was teaching his grandson, about route instructions and tulip diagrams. The route proceeded from Denton Burn, through Westerhope, to Stamfordham, Matfen, and Ryal. When it reached Stagshaw Roundabout, we Headed north straight up the A68. I had intended to put in another loop off the A68, through Chollerton, Barrasford, Wark, and Birtley but when I recce'd the route the roads were so pot-holed, a Land-Rover could have damaged it's suspension, so I deleted this section.

In medieval times the owners of LEE HALL, Bellingham had gone off to London for the week-end, leaving the servants in charge of the house. Late that evening, there was a knock at the door and when a servant answered the door, there stood a tinker, and he asked if it would be possible to have a bed for the night? The servant replied that the owners were not at home and he could not allow a stranger to stay without their permission.

The tinker said he was very tired, and he would try to find alternative accommodation, but would it be possible for him to leave his bag of wares in the house and he would pick them up first thing in the morning. The servant said that should not be a problem, so the tinker left his bag, which was a very long pack, in the Later that evening, a chambermaid, who was working kitchen. in the kitchen, thought that she saw the bag move, so she called for the gamekeeper, who was busy cleaning his guns.
