Not an MG model this month but at least one of our members has a Triumph Stag shown here. Envisioned as a luxury sports car, the Triumph Stag was designed to compete directly with the Mercedes-Benz SL class models. All Stags were four-seater convertible coupés, but for structural rigidity – and to meet new American rollover standards of the time – the Stag required a B-pillar "roll bar" hoop connected to the windscreen frame by a T-bar. A removable hardtop was a popular factory option for the early Stags, and was later supplied as a standard fitment.

The car started as a styling experiment cut and shaped from a 1963–64 Triumph 2000 pre-production saloon, which had also been styled by Michelotti, and loaned to him by Harry Webster, Director of Engineering at Triumph. Their agreement was that if Webster liked the design, Triumph could use the prototype as the basis of a new Triumph model. Harry Webster, who was a long time friend of Giovanni Michelotti, whom he called "Micho", loved the design and took the prototype back to England. The end result, a two-door drop head (convertible), had little in common with the styling of its progenitor 2000, but retained the suspension and driveline. Triumph liked the Michelotti design so much that they propagated the styling lines of the Stag into the new T2000/T2500 saloon and estate model lines of the 1970s.

Searching for the elusive John 'O' Groats

Some of our members may recall in an earlier club newsletter our little shunt on the second day of our holiday in Scotland last year. Anne, Maggie the TF and I had to return home from Fraserburgh after a mishap with a cyclist. Happy to say it all turned out ok in the end.

One year later our summer holiday included a second attempt to reach the official furthest point North on the Scottish mainland, John 'O' Groats. We joined forces with another car club I am involved with called Border Patrol. BP are enthusiastic owners of MGFs and TFs with member up and down the country. Keeping in touch mainly through social media, they attend charity runs, car shows, weekend runs and annual holidays. Plans were finalised for this year's annual vacation, a week in August in Aviemore.

Day 1, A697, sunshine and roof down, early first stop, Heighleygate for a coffee and a two car meet. Heading north to Lauder we stopped for lunch and met up with another four cars, two members had travelled up from Hull. The six car convoy continued north on the A68 to Edinburgh over the Forth Bridge onwards following the A9. We skirted around Perth and continued our journey north on the A9 to Aviemore. As with all trips in Scotland we were met with torrential rain, so roofs up and roofs down was the norm for the rest of the week. We arrived at the lodge late afternoon in glorious sunshine. Three further MGs, arriving from London, joined us later that evening.



Each of the following days were planned by a different member including my day trip to John 'O' Groats on the fifth day.

Day 2, Loch Ness. All nine cars headed west looking for the quiet B roads, causing chaos as we headed towards Loch Ness. These road workers did not expect a traffic jam in the Glens?



We stopped off for lunch at Fort Augustus before heading back to base camp that evening.

Day 3, Speyside. It soon became obvious we were in the land of distilleries. We must have passed dozens on our day trips so it would be rude not to visit at least one.





After the guided tour, several bottles at various strengths were purchased in the gift shop and the whisky tasting continued into the evening. 57% proof helped to ease me into a comfortable sleep that night.

Day 4, Applecross. Today we headed west to one of the best driving roads in the UK. I cannot recommend this route highly enough. Fantastic scenery and hair pin bends, this road off the A890 north of Kyle of Lochalsh has it all. We stopped off for a light lunch at Eilean Donan Castle on the A87 before heading further west through fantastic glens and mountains before dropping down to sea level turning right onto the A890 through Achmore, Ardnarff, New Kelso and through quaint Lochcarron golf course at Kirkton, on to Kishorn and then finally turning left at Tornapress. We climbed up through the pass, at the top we were met by fantastic views toward the Isle of Skye before dropping down to Applecross. Here we stopped for a late lunch. We did not book, but 16 weary travellers were met with open arms and our unexpected hosts made us welcome. We squeezed into a corner in an already full


restaurant. We ate well that day. We continued around the peninsula, again graced with fantastic sea views to our left as we looked west for more breath-taking views of the Isle of Skye. The Applecross run is all single lanes with passing places. We were met with the odd camper van, bus and an articulated lorry! I recall a similar experience when going the wrong way with the shopping trolley in Asda. Why is that? The road looped back onto the A896 and we headed east back to base, leaving behind great memories we will treasure for a life time.







Day 4, today we split into two packs. One trip took us to Fort George. The second pack took a different route through Nethy Bridge to the Cairngorms National Park. Anne and I decided to head to Inverness and then onto Fort George for some dolphin watching. This 18th century working fort was designed for modern warfare with low embankments to withstand repeated cannon fire. Deep moats and low defence walls were the thought of generals when designing one of the most expensive forts ever built after the Jackobite uprising of 1745. The original budget was £92,673 and doubled to £200,000, a vast figure at the time. Although open to the public it is still in use by the army. Another worthy trip if like us you enjoy history and castles.











MGN Isle of Man Tour 2017

Thanks to information from Stephen Ruddick from a tour he did earlier this year with his new club we have an almost ready made tour. It uses the same hotel, which he recommends, and the routes, one of which follows the TT course but at a more leisurely pace. The proposed details and costs are given below: -

Depart Heysham 16/5/17 on 14.15 ferry, arr Douglas @ 17.45 Depart Douglas 19/5/17 on 8.45 ferry, arr Heysham @ 12.15

My route planner says it is 2hr 21 mins from Newcastle to Heysham via A69 & M6, so possible to drive down in the morning.

Deposit £40 non refundable – minimum 5 cars

Double/twin - B&B £272.22 - B,B & 3 course EM £371.24

Single room as above £239.25 or £288.75

The single course option seemed popular in Northern Ireland but is not available in the package, but if you go B&B you could have a single course from the menu, or eat more during the day, (or both!!).

10% deposit with booking, 70% 56 days before remaining 20% 14 days before.

Total costs

Double/twin from £434.22 - £483.78 excl seats Single from £393.25 - £442.75 excl seats

As a comparison, a four-night tour with Scenic Car Tours is from £399 per person.
